*Whereas,* trees in our city increase property values, enhance the economic vitality of business areas, and beautify our community, and

*Whereas,* trees, wherever they are planted, are a source of joy and spiritual renewal.

*Now, Therefore, We,* Carter M. Hendricks, Mayor of the City of Hopkinsville, Kentucky, and Steve Tribble, Christian County Judge-Executive, do hereby proclaim April 7, 2017 as
